## Client Story: John Lowery and "Jasper"

Fidelco client John Lowery is a decorated military veteran who served in three branches of the U.S. military and was deployed overseas numerous times during the first Gulf War and in other operations in Afghanistan, Iraq, Somalia, and Europe. He served ten years as a Staff Sergeant in the Marine Corps, three and a half years as a Specialist in the Army, and ten years as a Staff Sergeant in the U.S. Air Force.

John first experienced vision loss when he started finding it difficult to see at night. He recalls there were years at a time when the

progression seemed to stop, until his vision deteriorated rapidly. John was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa and was medically retired from the U.S. Air Force in 2012.

He recalls this period in his life as a very challenging one. "It was all at once. It wasn't gradual. I could no longer do things I had always done. I went from being active in the military, and had spent my life fishing, rock climbing, and riding motorcycles off-road. Within a year, things had happened so guickly. It's hard to get your head around when it's not your choice. It made it easier at the time to surrender my autonomy and independence to my wife."

When John's wife passed away unexpectedly in 2021 in the middle of the pandemic, he made the decision to move to a less remote area of Maine to be closer to family, including his two sons, stepdaughter, and stepson.

John was soon contacted by Michelle Mason of the Maine Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The VA Visual Impairment Service provides a comprehensive program for veterans who are visually impaired. "Michelle came out once a week, taught me organization skills, how to use adaptive technology, and orientation

and mobility, including how to use a cane. Michelle's willingness to come to my home and help me during this time of uncertainty and restrictions was amazing."

As John developed adaptive skills and progressed through orientation and mobility training, Michelle told him about guide dog organizations and how guide dogs help people

who are blind experience increased mobility and independence. "Fidelco stood out for me because of its connections with the veteran community, and because Fidelco trains and places German Shepherd Dogs," John shares. "I previously had German Shepherd Dogs as pets and had worked in the military with them as working dogs, so Fidelco was a natural fit."

John remembers the rigorous application process to receive a Fidelco guide dog. He says, "Now I understand why. You're getting

a highly trained animal and an unparalleled support system. I had to be able to demonstrate I have the tools, mobility, and willingness to be a responsible guide dog user."

"Fidelco tailored the placement and training experience for me, coming to my home and training in my community." Fidelco Trainer and Placement Specialist Becky Cook was "the perfect fit... Becky understood everything I had gone through, and she was firm with me at the right times during training. The hardest thing for me was to relinquish control and totally

"When I got Jasper, my muscle memory had to come back. When you're losing your vision, even walking with a cane, your stride changes. I had started to

shuffle, because I didn't want to trip or fall into a pothole. I was embarrassed to ask for help."

As placement training progressed, John says he noticed changes. "I was lengthening my stride and walking more quickly with Jasper. Becky helped me get back out there comfortably doing things by myself. I am now able to handle a 95-pound German Shepherd guide dog who loves to work, and I'm physically able to keep up with him."

It's been almost three years since John was matched with Jasper, and he's out in the world again. For the past two years, John has

participated in a Brazilian jiu-jitsu program. He and Jasper share their home with a pet corgi and a cat. "There's a lot of land, which is great for Jasper to run around and get a lot of exercise. We do basic obedience every day to keep him sharp," says John. In addition to bus and train trips, John's future travel plans include a trip to visit family in Scotland.

John is a dedicated advocate for blinded veterans, sharing messaging so more veterans are aware of the guide dog benefits available to them. "I am advocating for there to be fewer restrictions so more veterans qualify for guide dogs." He says many veterans have financial constraints, and the VA provides a veterinary health benefit and other benefits in support of service dogs.

John is also eager to share about his partnership with Jasper and the benefits of guide dogs, including with schools and youth groups. He is a proponent of expanding public awareness so people understand that when the harness is on, a guide dog is working and should not be distracted.

"When I'm out with Jasper, people notice me.
People will stop and look, because Jasper's
so beautiful and intelligent, they can tell he's
working. In crowds, Jasper uses his head like
an oar, gently moving people out of the way so
we can get through. Even with PTS, I'm getting

more comfortable with people noticing me, thanks to Jasper."

"I know what it took to bring Jasper to me, and how much goes into training a guide dog at his level. I can't thank Fidelco enough, including Becky and Jasper's Puppy Raisers," says John. "There's a responsibility that comes with having a guide dog. I know I have this amazing animal. I love and trust him."

# Client Story: Janet Gerster and "Trooper"

"I thought about getting a guide dog for a long time," says first-time Fidelco guide dog user Janet Gerster. "For most of my life, I had enough vision to travel independently."

Janet's vision continued to deteriorate due to retinitis pigmentosa, and she began using a cane. The cane was helpful, but issues arose during her commute to work as a recruiter at the University of Pittsburgh. "When you use a cane, you are reactive. I have fairly good cane skills, but a cane can only tell you what's three feet in front of you."

As the days grew shorter in November in Pittsburgh, Janet noticed a discernible difference in her level of confidence traveling home from work. It was during one of her daily commutes on the bus that she noticed a man and his German Shepherd guide dog. Impressed by the way they worked together, Janet eventually asked him about his dog. As it turned out, the dog was a Fidelco guide dog. "I have always been drawn to the breed because I had a German Shepherd Dog growing up. When I saw that man and his dog working together so beautifully, it was the motivation I needed to reach out to Fidelco."

Upon doing so, Janet learned about Fidelco's

In-Community Placement training model, which was ideal for her as a working mother who could not spend three or more weeks away from home to train. After the application process, Fidelco Placement Specialist Chris Eastwood brought "Trooper"—or "Super Trooper" as Janet affectionately calls him—into her life in 2019.

The scenarios Trooper encountered in Janet's home area and at the university included buses filled with students and backpacks, multiple lanes of traffic, bicycles, security checkpoints, metal detectors, and more. "I wasn't in Fidelco's life, Fidelco was in mine," says Janet. "Trooper is so smart and considerate. For instance, he doesn't want me to have to walk through puddles. He slows down and speeds up in response to what is around us—unlike a cane. With Trooper, I have a lot more security and a lot less anxiety."

Fortunately, the University of Pittsburgh could not have been more accommodating when it came to Janet and Trooper. As soon as she received him, the

university put together a meet and greet with Chris Eastwood in attendance to answer questions about guide dog etiquette and training. Everyone at work fell in love with him, but also gave Janet the time and space needed to get acclimated and develop a strong bond with Trooper. Janet laughs, "There are times when colleagues come to my desk, and I know they're more interested in seeing Trooper than talking to me."

Janet continues to keep in touch with Trooper's Puppy Raisers, Jane and Michael Sirois, who have raised eight puppies for Fidelco!

"A lot of people had to do a lot to get Trooper to me and I am forever grateful. At least one person will stop me every day to say, 'What a beautiful dog!' And he really is in so many ways."

# FIDELCO GUIDE DOGS PUPPY 2024 OLYMPICS

Fidelco's Puppy Olympics, now in its fourth year, is a wonderful opportunity for our pups-in-training to interact with each other and work on the skills they will need to become incredible guide dog partners for people who are blind.





The event is kicked off by an **Opening Ceremony** with a Fidelco dog-in-training carrying a flameless torch. Pups earn points for each event and the medal winners take their places on the podium!



#### **Bobbing for Apples**

Volunteer Puppy Raisers have one minute to encourage their pups to touch, pick up, and bring them an apple. This game helps to build the relationship between the dog and human, and to re-enforce the "fetch" skill.

#### **Musical Chairs**

Volunteer Puppy Raisers walk around the circle with their pup and when the music stops, they must place the pup in a "sit" or "down" stay and grab a chair. If the pup breaks the "stay," the Puppy Raiser must leave their chair and correct the pup. The round is over when all seats are taken. This game re-enforces obedience around other dogs.

#### Bowling

The puppy has two attempts to knock down the pins, but the Volunteer Puppy Raiser cannot touch the pins or the dog. Pups sharpen their problem-solving skills and learn to rely on themselves to overcome obstacles.

#### **Egg Race**

The pup is guided to "heel," "stay," and "recall" while balancing an egg on a spoon. The fastest without dropping the egg wins, and pups learn obedience around other dogs.

## Volunteer Story: Chris Norwood

Chris Norwood was inspired to become involved with Fidelco while at a work event where Paralympic athlete and Retired U.S. Navy Lieutenant Brad Snyder was the guest speaker. "To see firsthand the bond Brad had with his Fidelco guide dog and the impact the dog had on his life was very powerful," shares Chris.

Chris quickly decided to volunteer with Fidelco and has since devoted countless hours serving in many capacities. As four-time Puppy Raisers, Chris and his family have welcomed Fidelco pups "Piper," "Cami," "Parrow," and "Uni" into their home. They also

adopted Fidelco career-change dog, "Leeta," who is a cherished family pet.

Chris is part of a network of volunteers and staff who provide guidance, advice, and friendship throughout the puppy raising process. "One thing I learned very quickly is the amazing people who repeatedly open their hearts and homes to these puppies are a very special group," Chris shares. "Spending Saturday mornings with them is not only educational but fun. Some of the more experienced Puppy Raisers share tips and personal success stories, and everyone joins in to welcome new puppies on placement day."

While Chris was raising Piper, he accepted a new career opportunity with The Hartford. "It was very important to find an employer that shared my views on volunteering and giving back to the community. I found that and more when I joined The Hartford," Chris says. "Employees are given paid time each year to volunteer with the organization of our choosing. Fidelco and The Hartford seemed like a great fit."

The Hartford's commitment to community and advancing social equity is reflected in its history of support of organizations like Fidelco. Through matching gifts, grants, and employee engagement, The Hartford has contributed to Fidelco's charitable mission of providing guide dog partnerships for people who are blind.

Chris has organized employee service days when The Hartford team members help with everything from kennel cleanups, to outdoor raking and planting, to van cleaning. Fidelco provides tailored program options to give corporate partners opportunities for team building and employee engagement, while enhancing guide dog training to make a difference in the lives of Fidelco clients.

"One of my favorite things to do is bring the puppies in to work with me," says Chris. "Colleagues love it, and it is so beneficial for the


